

Doodoo Voodoo In The Laundry



One of the most common questions we receive is: "Can I use Doodoo Voodoo in my washing machine?"

Yes, absolutely, and as a prespray on odors and stains.

You'll probably be surprised when you remove the items from the washer and discover that the whites are whiter and the colors more vibrant. :-)

It's easy to use Doodoo Voodoo in the wash, but here are some quick guidelines you should be sure to follow.

My Personal Experience

Here's an example of how you might assume you should use Doodoo Voodoo, and then a method I think you'll find more successful.



Our elderly special-needs dog Rocky is now on heart medication that causes him to urinate quite frequently. We take him outside about every ten minutes it seems (kidding), but he still can be counted on to pee on the incontinent pads we put down for him. These are the same pads that are used for human incontinence issues. They're quilted on one side and have a waterproof covering on the other that, in a perfect world, keeps urine and feces from bleeding through and soiling whatever surface the pad is on. The pads work like this most of the time, but not always, so we find ourselves with a spray bottle of Doodoo Voodoo in our hand quite frequently.

Even though we wash the pads frequently and typically very soon after Rocky soils them, they don't tend to come as clean as I'd like them to. I use a top brand's free & clear (unscented and with no dye) detergent, plus OxyClean oxidizer powder, hot water and an extra rinse cycle, but the pads have still been coming out with urine odor. So I decided it was time to use Doodoo Voodoo instead of detergent and OxyClean. I've not had to use Doodoo Voodoo in the wash in awhile, but customers have been telling me for decades how great Doodoo Voodoo is instead of detergent, so I figured I'd use Doodoo Voodoo the way I bet most of you would assume you should use it.

I added 6 ounces of Concentrate (equivalent to 3 ounces of SUPER Concentrate) to our brand new, super-computerized washer, then put the pee pads in. I set the washer on Heavy Duty, warm water and medium spin, then let it do its thing.

Sometimes Less Is More

The pads looked MUCH cleaner than they usually do. They were far whiter and the colors were more vibrant, plus I didn't see any remnant staining. Success! Six ounces proved to be more than I actually needed, so I ran the pads back through the washer with no soap and no Doodoo Voodoo, but on the same settings and with an extra rinse cycle.

How did I know I had used too much Doodoo Voodoo? There was no soapy residue or anything, but the scent of Doodoo Voodoo was still prominent when the washing machine finished the load. Some would argue that this is a good thing, given the alternative, but I felt it was a bit strong. ;-) After I ran the pads again and dried them, they were perfect.



What Method I Feel Works Better...And Why

I advise that instead of following the above protocol, you prespray your objects' stinky or stained areas with Doodoo Voodoo, let them set in the washer for up to a half hour so Doodoo Voodoo can work its magic, then turn the washer on and let it do its thing without adding any detergent or additional Doodoo Voodoo. I recommend that, if available, you use a Heavy Duty setting and that you call for an extra rinse cycle. I predict you'll attain better results with this method than with simply adding a bit of Doodoo Voodoo to the washer like you would conventional detergent.

Don't mix Doodoo Voodoo with detergents, oxygen boosters or anything else.

Expect Success!

Customers just like you have successfully used Doodoo Voodoo in the laundry to wash throw rugs that fit around the base of a toilet, innumerable items of clothing, countless ped beds, comforters, pillows, you name it. Spray your stained and odorous items, give Doodoo Voodoo some dwell time, then launder without adding any detergent or additional Doodoo Voodoo. I bet you'll be quite pleased with the results. :-)
